LLCC Enrollment Continues to Rise

Lincoln Land Community College has marked the fourth consecutive year of enrollment increases, according to the Fall 2025 Illinois Community College Opening Enrollment Report released in October 2025 by the Illinois Community College Board. From fall 2021 to fall 2025, LLCC has **increased 25.5% in opening headcount enrollment.**

2025 Highlights

- New construction lab:** LLCC opened a state-of-the-art construction lab in fall 2025, offering hands-on, real-world training in construction technologies and management, with flexible layouts and eight-week modules to support immersive learning.
- Expanded training facilities:** A \$5 million federal grant funded renovations and expansions for EMT and truck driver training, adding VR technology, a simulated apartment and new equipment, increasing annual capacity to over 400 EMT students and 90 truck driving students.
- RISE technology for education:** Through a \$550,000 USDA grant, LLCC implemented RISE technology to create immersive, connected classrooms across rural outreach centers and high schools, enhancing collaboration and access to courses, including teacher education programs.
- Industrial technology program expansion:** LLCC launched an industrial technology program at LLCC-Litchfield in fall 2025, admitting students for a three-semester sequence combining classroom instruction, hands-on learning and job shadowing. The program will expand to LLCC-Jacksonville in 2026, addressing local workforce needs and strengthening regional manufacturing industries.
- Customized training:** LLCC partnered with the Illinois Department of Revenue to deliver five tailored courses to 43 employees, offering onsite classes during work hours and streamlining payment. A new cohort begins in spring, reinforcing LLCC's commitment to industry collaboration and workforce development.
- State and national excellence:** LLCC student Mary Wichmann took home the gold medal in baking and pastry arts from the 2025 Illinois SkillsUSA Championship. LLCC Ag's Swine Specialist and Soil Specialist Teams won first place in the Illinois and National Professional Agriculture Student Conferences. The LLCC women's basketball team finished fifth in the NJCAA Division 2 National Championships.
